Solar Impressions

Solar Prints & Gyanotypes


The Solar Impressions exhibition held at the Newcastle Printmakers Workshop displayed works by 8 members of NPW illustrating the breadth and scope of the techniques of cyanotype and solar plates. Both techniques rely on the source of ultraviolet light to expose the image which can be achieved using the sun or a uv light unit.

Amanda Watts and Robin Hundt explore the depths of cyanotype blues that can be achieved with the use of found objects both translucent and opaque whereas Catherine Tempest has created



cyanotypes with the use of stencils and transparencies from original artwork. Marilyn O'Brien and Gina McDonald have translated drawings into solar plates while Nicole Pellow and Kerri Smith have imbued original photographs into rich tones through the same process. Valé Zakarauskas has combined solar, etching, stitching and solar fast images to create sophisticated images with multi- layers.

Both cyanotype and solar plate have interesting histories and have made it into the oeuvre of many printmakers in recent times especially as they are relatively simple processes and especially with solar plate being regarded as a non-toxic alternative to more traditional printmaking techniques.

Members Exhibition at Art Systems Wickham

This exhibition, recently exhibited at ASW Gallery, featured the works of 14 members of the Newcastle Printmakers Workshop, displaying a diverse range of printmaking techniques. Those involved were, Christopher Clifton, Michelle Hallinan, Vicki Macnamara, Michelle Strazzari, Therese Gabriel Wilkins -Trees, Janine Debenham, Mardi Ryan, Valè Zakarauskas, Jennifer Kelly, Helen Fenner, Penny Wilson, Stephanie Berick, Amanda Watts and Amanda Donohue. There was a great turnout for the opening celebration with Amanda Donohue officially opening Printopia. Many thanks to Colin the director of ASW for his ongoing support for NPW, hosting and hanging the exhibition. Many thanks also to Steph Berick for organising and co-ordinating the exhibition.





Included in the exhibition were the works of Mardi Ryan, with a series of screen prints of aerial views of Newcastle. These were created after she gave her family a helicopter ride as a gift. The resulting works are reimagined images of familiar places seen through a different lens. Janine Debenham's work 'Almost Invisible' explores both personal and universal themes associated with women and ageing - the narrative of memory, family, and the ageing of women in society, and the artworks of Amanda Watts, both titled 'Stronger than I Feel' are a contemplation on hidden strength of women who have come through intimate relationships where they have experienced personal violence against them. Strength to endure, leave violence and reclaim self.

Penny Wilson's 'Deal with the Challenge' reflects this chaotic time that we find ourselves in where nothing is how we would normally expect it to be - It is now essential to be purposeful, aware, to hold things together, stand firm.





























LOCUS at Newcastle Printmakers' Workshop brings to Newcastle a selection of pictures by NPW artists, fresh from the walls of New England Regional Art Museum in Armidale, where they were shown over the summer. Printmakers from NPW were invited to exhibit alongside colleagues from three other printmaking collectives: Black Gully Printmakers, Print Circle, and Southern Highlands Printmakers.

The exhibition at NERAM, curated by Belinda Hungerford, was titled LOCUS. The brief? To explore the varied meanings of place to each artist at a time when, courtesy of COVID, our worlds had become smaller and connection increasingly essential. More than 50 printmakers from geographically different locations participated, and the resulting exhibition showcased a diverse and insightful range of responses to a shared experience.


ENDANGERED ENDEMIC EXTINCT

UPDATE

Despite all the Covid interruptions a lot of progress has been made behind the scenes with the Hunter Visions – 2050 project and we are now in a position to report regularly to our members. It is our intention to be as informative as possible at every step of the way, so if you have questions please refer to either Chris Clifton and/or Patricia Wilson-Adams. To clarify from the outset– Chris has become the main driver of the project

with Trisch acting as "backstop" but this is in no way to say that we are the owners of the project – it is a pan workshop project with everyone being a stake holder.

Chris and I have now had two meetings with supporting galleries – Muswellbrook Regional Arts Centre and Museum of Art and Culture Lake Macquarie. The following has been decided:

- That there are to be several exhibitions run concurrently in Muswellbrook, Lake Macquarie and yet to be confirmed Singleton and the University. This is to be much along the lines of Hunter Red which was a collaborative exhibition between several galleries a few years ago.
- Exhibition dates to be confirmed but late 2024 is what we are aiming for.
- Works will be apportioned between the galleries most likely using broad themes such as environment, urban concerns, jobs, mining and wine interests etc. The gallery curators will collaborate with each other at this point.
- Member artists, a number of invited artists (who will be making prints with our technical help) and work from the community will be shown side by side agreed so far is for work to be unframed.
- There will be a joint catalogue for which we will need to get a lot of funding and also an online catalogue.
- Activities are to be documented with video.

We are very impressed with the amount of enthusiasm for this project shown by the participating galleries and their staff. They are keen to support workshops and to help with raising awareness and assisting with gaining funding. The project ticks many boxes for both artists and the galleries. The scope of this project has grown far beyond our initial expectations and promises to be extraordinary.

We are looking forward to your contributions and to a greater involvement from our members. There are a lot of avenues open for your contributions – running workshops – admin assistance – fund raising – liaising with community groups – raising awareness of the project and our aims. Above all your enthusiasm and good cheer will be really appreciated.



Print Study

Desolation, Internment Camp is a simple but visually powerful woodcut created by Ludwig Hirschfeld-Mack (1893-1965) in 1941 while he was being held in an internment camp in Orange, NSW. As an artist and later a teacher Hirschfeld-Mack was taught by Johannes Itten, Paul Klee and Wassily Kandinsky and was apprenticed to Lyonel Feininger in the printmaking workshop at Walter Gropius' Weimar Bauhaus in 1919. Hirschfeld-Mack taught in Germany, Wales and England before he was deported to Australia from England onboard the Dunerg in 1940 as an alien because he was German.

He later took up teaching art in Australia including as the Head of Painting at Geelong Grammar, continuing to espouse Bauhaus principles throughout his career. His works are held in art collections throughout Australia and overseas including the NSW Art Gallery, Ian Potter Museum of Art, Australian National Gallery, National Gallery of Victoria and the British Museum.



What has always drawn me to this print is that it is a stark but poignant reminder of the experience of the displaced and the hope they carry beyond confinement. It also encapsulates how an image can resonate long after the times it was created in.

BLINDS AND AIR CON

PLEASE LEAVE THE BLINDS DOWN AS YOU LEAVE THE WORKSHOP AS IT KEEPS THE MORNING SUN OFF THE BUILDING.

THE AIR CON HAS A TIMER OF TWO HOURS, AFTER WHICH IT WILL AUTOMATICALLY SWITCH OFF. JUST PRESS THE TIMER BUTTON AND THE ON BUTTON AGAIN TO GET IT STARTED AGAIN.

CARE OF PRESSES





Please make sure when you take the pressure off the press after use, the roller is left level and therefore equally balanced. Leaving presses uneven (photos above) places unnecessary pressure on our valuable equipment and makes it more difficult for the next person to set the press for use.





Presses correctly and evenly disengaged (above photos). Centre the press bed when finished and release roller pressure evenly. Presses must be covered with the sheets provided. Sanitise surfaces you have touched.

CARE OF BLANKETS

Sanitise and use clean hands or flippers when handling blankets. After use remove from the press and hang on the rack provided.

GENERAL CLEANING

It is the responsibility of ALL members who use the facilities to please cleanup. This includes cleaning the glass after inking up; wiping down surfaces in the wet area, wiping the prep table, sweeping or vacuuming the floor, wiping down and disinfecting all surfaces after use (Equipment, light switches, door handles and padlock, taps, appliances, and anything else you have touched). Take all your rubbish away with you, do not leave it in the bins.
